#### **Meeting Notes March 2, 2016**

President Derek Antonelli opened the 7 pm meeting at the office of the ID Dept. of Fish and Game. The group began with planning spring and Summer Field trips. See above.

Karen briefly discussed the Featured Plant for March – *Letharia Vulpina* – noting it's characteristics and poisonous attributes.

Derek gave a presentation on the rare plant ranking process in Idaho. He is the lead of the North Idaho Rare Plant working Group which will meet April 5, 2016 in CDA. This is an independent group formed by the INPS with participants from various state and federal agencies. The later State Conference will be held in Boise. He gave the group an overview of the ranking process of plant populations. The Natureserve tool is an Excel based plant ranking program and simplifies action needed to protect these plants locally and globally. Results of the ranking will be available to the public. Derek also will make available his discussion of the process

to any interested persons. Anyone can contribute rare plant information using forms available via the Idaho Fish and Wildlife Information System (IFWIS) website or participate in the Rare Plant Working Group. Individuals may also sign up to help out on rare plant surveys. Several examples of rare plants with photos and plant information were also enjoyed by the group.

## **Featured Plant for April, 2016: More Lichens- Witch's Hair**-Alectoria sarmentosa.



**General:** Large, hanging hair lichen, up to 15-30 cm long, pale green, intricately branched and dull, pale green but pliant and lacking a central cord. The branches terminate in minute black tips.

**Habitat**: Humid forest, especially on conifers; common; mountains to subalpine; Alaska to Idaho.

**Reproduction:** Saucer shaped fruiting bodies called <u>apothecia</u> which are produced by its algae fungal partner.

Notes: The genus name Alectoria means

#### Alectoria sarmentosa

'unmarried' and refers to the relative

absence of fruiting bodies in many of these lichens. Common witch's hair however is often fertile. Look for tiny brown saucers scattered among the branches. The species name 'sarmentosa' is Latin for 'twiggy'. Angel hair (Ramalina thrausta) is similar but its branches are more delicate and terminate in minute, green hooks (use a hand lens to see them). It is listed as a rare North Idaho lichen. Bring a hand lens and plant guide to the next meeting and we will look at some lichen specimens. Karen Williams
